

## 2019/20 Pupil Premium Grant Impact Report

## What is the Pupil Premium Grant?

- The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is the name of the funding given directly to schools to support students who receive free school meals, who are in public care or young people whose parents are in the armed forces.
- In 2019/20 all schools receive £935 for each student covered by the PPG.
- RDUTC has 77 students for whom it receives the PPG, which is 26% of the total population. This generates a total PPG income of £71,995.

## What are the barriers to learning for the RDUTC Pupil Premium Cohort?

- Poor attendance
- Complex social issues dysfunctional home lives
- Poor literacy and numeracy skills
- High FTEs at previous schools
- Unable to afford to travel to RDUTC
- Unable to afford resources to support revision at home
